#### Convention Review – 2012 OKC Event #FT1918 – Wichita Mountain Safari by Susan Cook

You expect great field trips at Convention, don't you? After all, host clubs usually have three years to plan for the event. They are expecting you; they want to give you the best of what their region offers. With that in mind, 53 ADDC members and guests made reservations for the 61st annual ADDC Convention in Oklahoma City, expecting a great field trip. When we first registered, it was hinted that there might be a surprise for us but to **expect**:

- the Wichita Mountains to offer some of the world's most unique geology.
- to see elk, bison, and other animals common to this region because the mountains are a refuge for them.
- to wear comfortable clothes/shoes to experience nature firsthand on a short hike over the Burford Lake Trail.
- Dr. Neil Suneson of the University of Oklahoma and Senior Geologist for the Oklahoma Geological Survey to be our ever-entertaining and informative guide on the expedition.

What made this field trip so memorable though was the **unexpected**. The Red Earth Desk and Derrick Club (REDD) did NOT have three years of planning. They readily volunteered when our original Region VI plans changed. The club's members immediately started researching possible field trips and seminars. This particular tour may have slightly secured the facts. Lunch was not at the Meers' corner store, and the ¼ mile hike was probably a mile if not further. The Burford Trail represented more history than could be captioned in a short bio for a convention packet. The trail had evidently been built in the mid 1930's by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC's). To date, the documentation of that trail has not been discovered on a map or in the reference library. It had virtually been forgotten for many years until the wildfires of 2011 uncovered it. Drainage systems were already in place; the trail had been cleared of trees and lined with rocks. Several groups began working to restore and improve the trail: Friends of the Wichitas, Treasure Lake Job Corps, Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge, OK Geological Survey, Oklahoma University and the Red Earth Desk and Derrick Club (REDD). Their current project is to create a geological interpretive trail with signs at "hot spots" along the Burford Trail. Our Field Trip—Event #FT1918, was the first group of participants (outside the initial organizations) to hike it. As we ventured along, we were able to experience the history of the trail through temporary signage provided by REDD.

The Wichita Mountains are truly unique and it would take Dr. Suneson and his partner, the renowned and equally entertaining, Dr. M. Charles Gilbert, ConocoPhillips School of Geology & Geophysics, to fully educate us. Dr. Gilbert's Field Guide, which was given to every attendee, explained many of the frequently asked questions. Are the Wichitas really mountains? Yes, the Wichita Mountains are one of four primary mountain ranges within Oklahoma. How high is Mount Scott? Mount Scott has 1100 – 1200' of exposed relief and an elevation of 2464'. How old are the mountains? The Wichitas are formed by 530 to 540 million years-old igneous rocks.

We also learned that The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge (WMWR) is teaming with other societies to keep the refuge a safe place for the animals that call it home but also to educate the public about the natural beauty and history of this particular area. WMWR staff joined us at the trail and opened the Visitors' Center as well.

This was truly a wonderful example of how fun education can be when you are taken outside of the classroom and guided by experts in the field. I know that I was not the only one to appreciate the awesomeness of it all. We got more than we were expecting, but as the day progressed it became impossible to determine the advertised surprise. Was it that the esteemed Dr. Gilbert joined us? Was it that lunch was to be a choice in Medicine Park, situated alongside a pretty creek, instead of a 12" hamburger at a store in Meers, OK? Was it that we were the first to hike the newly re-discovered trail? Was it the fantastic views of the Wichitas or the great driver, who handled the bus so expertly? Perhaps it was the memento at the end of the journey. Any of those would be welcomed surprises, but I choose to believe this: The surprise was that the permanent signage for the interpretive trail will be provided by the Red Earth Desk and Derrick Club. Why should that surprise me? REDD members are always thinking outside the box, taking risks, and asking tough questions. For them to be involved in this ground-breaking event is typical. I'm waiting for them to tell thousands of future visitors to the Wichitas, "Here's Your Sign!"


