Mr. Galen Schwertfeger, Environmental Protection Specialist for the Bureau of Land Management

Topic:

An overview of BLM requirements for surface restoration and reclamation after a well is plugged. Q&A to follow.

Mr. Schwertfeger earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Management from Kansas State University in 1979 and was recruited by The Western Company of North America, a major Hydraulic Fracturing Co. as a Management Trainee. During his tenure with The Western Company, he served as Service Supervisor and was promoted to Sales and Service Representative in the deep Anadarko Basin before being selected to serve as the Ft. Worth Basin Technical Sales Manager where he received extensive training in both advanced stimulation and cement design. He eventually served as District Operations Manager in Wichita Falls, Texas before leaving the company in 1986. During the last three years, Galen has had the honor to be selected as one of the BLM's representatives to present at consultations with Sovereign Tribal Nations, members of the National BIA Leadership, and local governments the fundamentals and concerns of directional drilling and hydraulic fracturing, as well as briefing proposed rule changes.

March 12, 2014 Presentation Recap by Susan Cook

The Tulsa Oil Drop

I'm not sure whose idea it was (President Kay Williams' or Program Chairman Kris Russell), but it turned out to be quite an educational and fun one, according to comments made afterwards. As a society of professional people, we typically celebrate March as Desk and Derrick Awareness Month. Therefore, we encourage members to invite guests to our Membership Meeting and give special effort to provide a program that sums up what Desk and Derrick is all about. It must have been decided by someone to introduce our Student Outreach Programs to our guests and even to some of our newer members who might not previously been aware of these activities.

Val Bode, Immediate Past President, was first on the agenda. She presented the PetroPro program, created by the Oklahoma Energy Resources Board (OERB). Val has been a PetroPro for many years. The program was designed to help educate Oklahoma school children about the oil and gas industry. Our club is fortunate to have other PetroPro presenters in it as well. Val asked us to help create in our minds, a fourth grade classroom; wherein we were all students. She then gave a condensed version of what actually happens in a live PetroPro presentation. They pass around fossils and explain how oil is formed. The kids get to invest in a proposed well and learn the drilling aspects. For more details, see Val's article on page 6 of this edition.

Next in line was Sarah Kuegel, Student Outreach Committee Chairman. Her committee is distributing the Energy Activity Book (EAB), entitled "A Bit of Fun", to community teachers. EAB's were designed to help students and teachers learn about the importance of the oil and gas industry, specifically how it relates to our daily lives. These books may be purchased from the Association Distribution Office at a nominal charge. But please see Sarah's article and the survey (pages 7-8) that will accompany books given to teachers. She hopes the survey will tell us how best to target the appropriate age group of students.

Susan Cook and Brenda Bennett teamed up to present The Magic Suitcase, which has been around for more than fifty years. Its origination story is not entirely known but it was designed in effort to help the public overcome its aversion to petrochemicals as just cheap plastics. Along the way, it also became a tool for changing the public's attitude toward the oil and gas industry. Perhaps we were always the "big, bad oil company" if we could provide things that improved our daily lives. The Magic Suitcase travels to elementary schools to show just how important our industry is to everyone—children, adults, businesses, etc. Since a condensed version of the program was needed, Susan and Brenda brought a condensed suitcase. Still, they were able to fit in things made of plastic (baggies, clock, Mardi Gras beads, pillbox, cassette tapes, toys). The suitcase also contained things developed from chemicals (candle, lipstick, medicine). Susan explained that a script for the full presentation is available for the asking. Contact her: susan@elsonoil.com. In the script, you will find many more ideas for fill your own suitcase and even several experiments to try. You can expand the topics and make your own unique presentation.

All in all, the Desk and Derrick 4th graders had a bit of fun while being educated. And I know the presenters had a great time sharing their talents for the good of the club--kudos to whoever came up with the idea.

OERB Petro Pros

Petro Pros are oil and natural gas professionals who volunteer their time to visit Oklahoma classrooms to show kids the science and business side of their industry. During their one-hour presentation, Petro Pros use rocks, fossils, drill bits and maps to demonstrate how oil and natural gas are formed, discovered and produced.



At the March membership meeting of our Desk and Derrick club, I was invited to give the audience a 'condensed' version of a Petro Pro Presentation. My history as a Petro Pro goes back to the early 2000's when I was employed by ONEOK Energy Resources, where I was permitted and encouraged to volunteer my time to help educate Oklahoma school children about the oil & gas industry.

I asked my Desk and Derrick audience to "pretend" they were fourth graders, and we had a great interactive presentation. Hands went up as I asked questions; "Do any of you know someone who works in the oil and gas industry?" — "What kind of job could you get in the industry?" — "What does it tell you about Oklahoma if you find this fossil of a sea animal in your back yard?" and one of the all time favorites, "Do you know what this fossil, called a copralite, is?" (Answer: it's fossilized dinosaur poop)

We passed around fossils and rock and mineral samples, and a few "kids" got to hold a drill bit. Full length presentations include a couple of simple experiments to demonstrate the different properties of oil and water and to illustrate porosity and permeability. My Petro Pro presentations always included an opportunity for children to "invest" in a well proposal by using polished rocks for money, with the chance to double their "money" or perhaps lose everything to a dry hole.

The OERB provides training to industry professionals from all disciplines and provides a kit with all the materials necessary to successfully represent our industry and illustrate to youngsters the importance of oil and gas to our state. OERB also provides safety training to kids, warning them about the dangers of well sites and tank batteries, using videos, their website, and printed materials.

Note that packets will be distributed to the science coordinators of the following districts: Tulsa Public, Union, Jenks, Owasso, and Bixby. The number each district receives is proportional to the number of schools they have for our target age group. There will be a short survey attached that the teacher can fill out and return to Desk and Derrick Club of Tulsa. This will allow the Student Outreach Committee to evaluate the effectiveness of this project. Thank you for all of your help.





Please see guidelines and form, also remember all criteria met is an important factor.


