



"What is Desk and Derrick?"

as presented by Karen Gibbs

"GREATER KNOWLEDGE - GREATER SERVICE"



The Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs (ADDC) is an international educational organization made up of individuals employed in or affiliated with the petroleum, energy, and allied industries.

Our Mission Statement is to enhance and foster a positive image to the global community by promoting the contributions of the petroleum, energy and allied industries through education by using all resources available.

Our Purpose is to promote the educational and professional development of individuals employed in or affiliated with the petroleum, energy, and allied industries, and to educate the general public about these industries.

Now, as members of Desk and Derrick we are often asked, "What is Desk and Derrick?" to which the patented answer is: It's an organization of people employed in the petroleum and allied energy industries that meet once a month to hear an educational speaker present a program about some part of the petroleum or allied energy industry.

This is a 67-year-old organization that has had its ups and down, seen good times and bad and has survived them all. We will survive again. For new members, here is a little background about the organization of Desk and Derrick. The first club was formed in New Orleans in 1949, by a group of secretaries who felt the need to learn more about the work at the derrick that created the piles of work on their desks; thus the name Desk and Derrick.

So what makes Desk and Derrick work? Let's explore the letters together.

D – DECISIONS

The *decisions* of Mrs. Inez Awty Schaeffer, a secretary in the Land Department with Humble Oil and Refining Company, to form the first Club in New Orleans, followed by the decision of secretaries in Jackson, Mississippi, Los Angeles, California and Houston, Texas to also form clubs. The decision of these four clubs to meet together in July 1951 and organize the Association of Desk and Derrick Club of North America, which was changed in 1977 to the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs. Most importantly, *YOUR DECISION* to join for the purpose of gaining more knowledge about the industry and spread that information to our communities today.

E – ENHANCE AND ENRICH

Enhance your professional development through educational, motivational, and leadership programs and seminars. **Enrich** your personal life with a diverse multitude of friends and members, all of whom are willing and eager to share with us their enhanced, enriched experiences in Desk and Derrick.

S - SINCERITY

The *sincerity* of the members and their employers to provide a friendly, comfortable forum to educate and develop the members so we can provide "Greater Service and Greater Knowledge" when participating in various job assignments necessary at their *Desk* to keep the *Derrick* "turning to the right, or making hole".

K – KNOWLEDGE

Each of our members associated with this industry, has a task to perform, but having the *knowledge* to understand how their particular job fits in with the rest of the work force to make their organizations profitable, makes them better individuals. Desk and Derrick provides this *knowledge* with educational speakers, field trips, and seminars that explain the various aspects of the petroleum and allied energy industries and how they all fit together.

AND - pulls the "DESK" and "DERRICK" together.

D – DETERMINATION

Without the *determination* of the founders of the first four clubs, the Association would not exist. As members, we must continue to be determined to keep our clubs and the Association active in providing education to the members and communities in which we live and work. As an individual member your determination should be to use the meetings to gain knowledge, which will enable you to better understand your job and our industry. And also a GREAT source for networking.

E – **ENCOURAGEMENT**

We need *encouragement* to meet the obstacles life brings. No task is unbearable when you are surrounded by a group of encouraging friends. If you are insecure about public speaking or chairing a committee or even voicing an opinion, Desk and Derrick is a great training arena to overcome your insecurity, and we encourage you to speak out. Those who seem to be comfortable at the lectern or who willingly speak out during a meeting have all had to overcome these same feelings through encouragement from fellow members.

R - RESPONSIBILITY

Each one of us has to take *responsibility* to decide how we want Desk and Derrick to work for us. Be responsible if you are unsure about the role you want to play? Ask another member about committee work, chairing a committee, how to become a director or an office. The more responsibility you take on as a member, the more you will receive in return. Remember this is a volunteer organization and it's our responsibility as members to Volunteer whenever needed. Get Connected. Be Committed.

R - RECOGNITION

This follows responsibility because when you take on responsibilities you are recognized and applauded for your achievements. *Recognition* comes in various forms. Awards are given at the club, regional and national level, recognizing accomplishments of members. However, the highest form of recognition is SELF-SATISFACTION – knowing you took responsibility for a challenging task and recognizing that you successfully conquered the foe!

I – INVOLVEMENT

A great word, *involvement*. Anytime you make a decision to participate in any endeavor, you must become involved to gain the most satisfaction from your decision. For me, personally, I know that until I became actively involved in Desk and Derrick activities, (really really great great people and FUN times together), the meetings were just meetings, where I met with acquaintances, but once my involvement increased, these acquaintances became my friends, and I made more friends. K – KINDNESS

Yes, *Kindness* and Caring go hand in hand. Once you become a member of Desk and Derrick you will never face life's challenges alone again, whether here at home or in another city, you can call upon a member for help and be treated with *kindness*.

So you have heard what makes Desk and Derrick. Did you recognize yourself in any of these?



- 26. Oil consumed in the U.S. by driving is nearly two times that consumed by drivers in China and India combined.
- 27. Saudi Arabia produces 8.1 million barrels of oil per day.
- 28. Oil spills account for only about 5% of the oil entering the oceans. The Coast Guard estimates that for U.S. waters, sewage treatment plants discharge twice as much oil each year as tanker spills.
- 29. Oil was first successfully drilled in the U.S. in Titusville, Pennsylvania, in 1859.
- 30. Crude oil was first pumped from the ground in Sichuan, China 2,500 years ago.
- 31. The first offshore wells were off the coast of Louisiana during the 1950s.
- 32. The Texas Oil Boom and the modern industrialization of oil production in the U.S. began with a major gusher at Spindletop on January 10th, 1901 near Beaumont, Texas.
- 33. Glycerin -- a sweet-tasting synthetic ingredient used in toothpaste and other products -- is a petrochemical derived from oil.
- 34. Oil is used to make common synthetic fabrics like polyester, nylon, vinyl and acrylic.
- 35. The U.S. oil production is about 5.36 million barrels a day.
- 36. The U.S. imports about 9.01 million barrels a day.
- 37. Canada actually supplies the most crude oil to the U.S. (1.9 million barrels per day).
- 38. 378 million gallons of gas are consumed in the U.S. every day.
- 39. The ExxonMobil refinery in Baytown, Texas, is the largest-capacity refinery in the U.S. (560,640 barrels a day).
- 40. Total daily oil production around the world is 84,365,ai barrels a day
- 41. Total daily oil consumption around the world is 84,249,000 barrels/day.
- 42. The U.S. has 21 billion barrels in current oil reserves, which is enough to last eight years at current consumption levels.
- 43. In 2006, the EPA mandated that diesel fuel refiners had to reduce the sulfur content of their fuel by 97% because sulfur gas compounds are a major source of ai pollution.
- 44. Diesel fuel produced about 11% more energy than an equal volume of gasoline and actually produces slightly less carbon dioxide emissions.
- 45. Most of the oil found in the ocean has oozed naturally from the ocean floor.
- 46. John D. Rockefeller, who revolutionized and dominated the oil industry in the late 19th and early 20th century, had a net worth measuring \$1.4 trillion (today's dollars) at the time of his death.
- 47. After Hurricane Katrina, the U.S. was forced to use 11 million barrels of its reserves because of the damage to the Gulf Coast.
- 48. The largest oil field in the U.S. is Prudhoe Bay, Alaska, which covers 213,453 acres and originally contained 25 billion barrels of oil.
- 49. Canada has the third largest amount of reserves of any country, 97% of which are in oil sands.
- 50. The Trans-Alaska Pipeline has shipped over 16 billion barrels of oil since it came online in 1977.

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Document and Spreadsheet Templates 101

Document and spreadsheet templates are great tools for creating efficiencies in recurring tasks. However, accurately creating and utilizing such templates is essential. More often than not, we create documents and spreadsheets that are referred to and/or labelled as "templates" but these "templates" are merely standard documents, spreadsheets and PDFs.

Last month, I wrote about an intended audience. If the intent of a "template" is to have a paper form that is completed by hand, that is one subject. However, it is quite another subject if the intent is to have a paperless trail with electronically utilized and/or distributed templates and archived computer files.

Microsoft Word arrives in the box or via download with a plethora of built-in document templates for nearly every word processing need one can imagine. These integrated templates are accessible via three easy steps—1) open Microsoft Word, 2) select a template, and 3) input one's specific information. The details of these steps are nicely detailed in the Opening and Using a Microsoft Word Template section of How to Use Document Templates in Microsoft Word (http://www.digitaltrends.com/computing/use-document-templates-microsoft-word/).

Creating one's proprietary templates in *Microsoft Word* is equally as simple with four easy steps—1) open *Microsoft Word*, 2) open a blank document, 3) create the template, and 4) save the template. The details of these steps are well detailed at <a href="http://www.digitaltrends.com/computing/use-document-templates-microsoft-word/#creating%20a%20template under *Creating a Microsoft Word Template*. The fourth step is the important step that differentiates a document template from a standard document.

Built-in *Microsoft Word* document templates and proprietary documents—that are saved as a document template format—have a common, unique feature. A true document template guides the user to save the document template as a new, differently named document with a different format (i.e., *Word 97-2003 Document* [.doc]), thus preserving the template features of the document template file for repeated use.

As with Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel arrives with a generous offering of built-in spreadsheet templates for nearly every workbook and worksheet need one can imagine. These included templates are accessible via three easy steps—1) open Microsoft Excel, 2) select a template, and 3) input one's specific information. The details of these steps are well detailed at http://www.excel-easy.com/basics/templates.html#existing-templates under Existing Templates.

Creating one's proprietary workbook and spreadsheet templates in *Microsoft Excel* is equally as simple with four easy steps—1) open *Microsoft Excel*, 2) open a blank document, 3) create the template, and 4) save the template. The details of these steps are nicely detailed in the *Create a Template* section at http://www.excel-easy.com/basics/templates.html#create-atemplate. The important step that differentiates a spreadsheet template from a standard spreadsheet is saving the spreadsheet as an *Excel Template* (*.xltx), available in the *Save as type*: drop-down list.

As with *Microsoft Word*, built-in *Microsoft Excel* spreadsheet templates and proprietary spreadsheets—that are saved as a spreadsheet template format—have a common, unique feature. A true spreadsheet template guides the user to save the spreadsheet template as a new, differently named workbook with a different format (i.e., *Excel 97-2003 Workbook* [.xls]), thus preserving the template features of the spreadsheet template file for repeated use.

Unless one is working with a PDF fillable form that can be completed electronically, a standard PDF document can—for all practical purposes—be considered a template for a paper form that is completed by hand. This is true, only because a standard PDF document requires an above and beyond effort to modify the document. I will discuss fillable forms in greater detail in July. In the interim, it is sufficient to say a PDF fillable form is a good situation to have a blank, fillable template in the archives for repeated use.
