Financial Energy Trading & Cushing Hub Discussion

I have a “disclaimer” right up front—I know absolutely NOTHING about the New York Stock Exchange other than you are supposed to “Buy Low; Sell High”. I have watched scenes of the New York Stock Exchange on the news (occasionally), and it’s a VERY loud and noisy place to work—lots of yelling and screaming. Oh, one more thing, at the beginning of this year after WPX Energy split from Williams Companies, our President Ralph Hill rang the opening bell! OK—that’s it!

I had never even heard of the New York Mercantile Exchange, NYMEX, until Mr. Seng gave his presentation. However, I will attempt to give you all some useful and **hopefully** accurate information about NYMEX, which consists of Energy Commodity Futures Contracts. (Thank goodness, I have a copy of his presentation!! Otherwise I would have to do another disclaimer about the accuracy of this information.)

A **futures** contract is “...a legally binding obligation for the holder of the contract to buy or sell a particular commodity at a specific price and location at a specific date in the future” as defined by NYMEX. There are four (4) components of a futures contract: Commodity; price; location; and date. Trades between counterparties are conducted under the *International Swaps and Derivatives Association (ISDA) “2002 Master Agreement”*.

There are two functions of a NYMEX Energy Contract. One function is “price discovery”, which establishes a price for Crude oil, natural gas, heating oil, and unleaded gasoline for any future point in time. The second function is “hedging” Hedging uses futures contract and related products to reduce price and/or physical risk.

As with any other profession or activity, there are certain terms with particular meaning regarding futures contracts. “Ask” is a motion to sell at a specified price; the same as offer. “Bid is a motion to buy at a specified price”; the opposite of offer. I am sure that we have all heard the terms Bull and Bear in reference to the market place. A “Bull” investor is one who anticipates an increase in price or volatility, while a “Bear” is an investor who anticipates a decline in price or volatility. I have always had a hard time distinguishing between the two because I consider both animals to be “strong” and neither animal would ever run from a fight; so, I need to

come up with something to help me remember which is which. Does anyone have a suggestion?

The NYMEX Trading Pit is made up of a variety of people holding different jobs, as in any company or organization. There are floor brokers, locals (large, small, spreaders), ring reporters, ring chairman, floor committee members, NYMEX Compliance and CFTC compliance "officers" and the NYMEX staff. No wonder it's so crowded on the floor—look at all of the people occupying that small space.

There are many Crude Oil ("CL") contract specifications. One of the most noted contracts initiated by NYMEX in 1983 is the "West Texas Intermediate" (WTI) which is a low-sulphur or sweet crude. OK, for this next fact, get out your Abbreviators because a unit is 1,000 BBL per contract (42,000 gallons). The price quotes are in U.S. dollars and cents per BBL. The minimum price fluctuation is \$0.01 (\$10.00/ BBL). The delivery point is F.O.B. ("free onboard" or "delivered"). The seller's facilities can be at Oklahoma's very own Cushing or any pipeline or storage facility with access to Cushing Storage, TEPPCO or Equilon pipelines.

There are other contract specifications such as deliveries are to be made uniformly across the month, and the trading hours or "Open Outcry/Pit" are 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. (EST). The CME or Globex hours are Sunday through Friday from 6:00 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. (EST). The contract specification is 9 consecutive years of trading months; however, "strips" are available for terms of 2 to 30 consecutive months. The last trading day is three (3) business days prior to the 25th of the month. If the event that the 25th is a non-trading day (holiday, Saturday or Sunday), settlement will occur three (3) business days prior to the business day prior to the business day ahead of the 25th. The margin requirement for a crude oil contract is \$5,100.

There is another contract specification for Heating Oil (HO), also known as "Number 2 Fuel Oil". A unit consists of 42,000 gallons, and price quotes are in US dollars and center per BBL. The minimum price fluctuation is \$0.0001/gallon. The delivery point is F.O.B. ("free onboard" or "delivered") at the petroleum product terminals in New York Harbor. Deliveries are to be made uniformly across the month. The last trading day is the last day of the month preceding the month of production.

Mr. Seng also gave us information about Cushing – NYMEX Crude Oil Hub. Cushing is known as the "Pipeline Crossroads of the World", and it is located a short distance from Tulsa.

Cushing's Crude Oil Hub is a crude storage tank farm. It is the world's **largest** crude storage facility!! TEPPCO, Equilon and TransCanada all have crude oil pipeline running into the Hub. It has a 46 million barrel storage capacity, of which 16% is US. It receives Gulf Coast and Midwest crude, which is stored or transported to Midwest oil refineries. The key players are Enbridge, BP, Semgroup, Conoco-Phillips, Sunoco, Plains All-American and TEPPCO.

There are several issues surrounding the Cushing Crude Oil Hub. It has had historically high inventory levels. There is no incremental storage capacity at the present time. Domestic production is increasing due to the shale plays— Bakken Shale, ND and Mississippian Lime in Oklahoma. Canadian imports are increasing (the original Keystone Pipeline), and there are no takeaway capacity to the Gulf Coast. As a result, Gulf Coast refiners pay more for crude imports.

The good news is that there are several solutions being considered. The Seaway Pipeline reversal is one solution. Enbridge and Enterprise own the Seaway Pipeline 50/50. It is an existing 500-mile crude oil line from Freeport, TX to Cushing, OK. A reverse flow is being considered in the late second quarter of 2012 at 150K BBL's a day. In 2013, the flow should increase to 400K BBL's a day in the southbound.

The Keystone XL project is TransCanada's proposed two-phase crude oil pipeline. It would transport tar sands crude from Canada's Alberta province to Texas. It will be done in two phases. Phase I will be from Albert to Cushing (1,180 miles) and Phase II will be from Cushing to Nederland, Texas, an additional 435 miles.

For these solutions to be considered, there are legal issues. The good news is that there are not any legal issues concerning the Seaway Pipeline because there are existing pipelines which will reverse pump stations. There are legal issues surrounding the Keystone XL because a Presidential Permit will be required for Phase I because of international border crossing. The first application was delayed by the US State Department over the proposed Sandhills, NE route. Keystone is investigating alternate route(s) and will refile. TransCanada will proceed with the southern section of Phase II.

There is a new project being proposed for ONEOK Bakken to Cushing crude oil pipeline. It will cost between \$1.5 - \$1.8 billion, and will be 1,300 miles long. It will run from Bakken Shale to the Cushing Hub. It is projected that the pipeline will be in service sometime in 2015.
