


October 9th, 2013 Meeting

Take Me Home Country Road

We were greeted in the lobby by our hotel event coordinator and welcomed by the check-in staff with fresh West Virginia apples and warm apple cider. Throughout our stay, EVERY staff member at the Marriot Charleston Town Center devoted their time to making sure every Desk and Derrick member attending this 62nd Annual ADDC Convention felt pampered and special.

This was my 3rd convention and each year I leave saying, "It will take a lot to top this one!" and each year following, the host club manages to do just that. Region I and all their helpers did a fabulous job from start to finish. From the field trips to interesting scenic locations in the hills of West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Kentucky, to the speakers at the seminars, symposium and luncheons and into the evenings with entertainment at the dinners and banquet, every minute was full of learning, laughter and sharing of interesting information.



Day 2 - The field trip I chose was to the Greenbrier Cold War Bunker and to an exhibition coal mine (circa 1900). We began with a 2½ hr bus ride through the beautiful Appalachian Mountains and although we were a little early for the autumn foliage, we could see the beginning of fall colors mixed among the deep greens on the hillsides. We arrived at the Greenbrier Hotel and were taken on a tour of this award winning luxury resort where 26 presidents and numerous diplomats and celebrities have stayed. In the late 1950s, the U.S. government built a secret emergency relocation center ("The Bunker") to house Congress in the aftermath of a nuclear attack. The classified, underground facility was named "Project Greek Island". Although the bunker was kept stocked with supplies for 30 years, it was never actually used as an emergency location, even during the Cuban Missile Crisis. The bunker's existence was not acknowledged until Ted Gup of The Washington Post revealed it in a 1992 story; immediately after the Post story, the government decommissioned the bunker. The facility has since been renovated and is also used as a data storage facility for the private sector.



After having an enjoyable lunch at Sam Snead's, a part of the Golf Club, we once again loaded the bus and headed to the Exhibition Coal Mine in Beckley. As we entered the mine on a tram, our guide gave us a brief lesson on how the coal miners would spend hours digging out the coal from the dark, cold, damp walls of the mine. He showed us many tools and explained how they were used. One of the most important tools for the early miners was a small cage with a canary inside. The singing canary gave comfort to the miners, not through their tweets and whistles, but by the fact that as long as the bird was singing, the area was free of toxic gases.

If the canary stopped singing, the miner had only a little time to exit the mine or he too would die from the fumes. Situated on the grounds is also a period coal camp, with buildings representative of early 20th century camp life, such as the company store, Superintendent's house, camp church, camp school and camp blacksmith shop. (NOTE: the blacksmith often moonlighted as the camp dentist. YIKES!)



Leaving from the mine, we made a short trip across town to stop at the Tamarack for some shopping. Set up in a circle, this unique center houses the goods and crafts of local artisans. From paintings and sculptures to baked goods, local honeys and syrups, and blown glass to musical instruments, there was something of interest for everyone. Last stop - Pasqual Mira's Italian Restaurant for a delicious dinner before returning to the hotel. This field trip was the longest one I have ever been on (16 hrs!). Everyone had plenty of time to get to know each other better and we all returned exhausted, but each member definitely came off that bus with "Greater Knowledge".

Day 3 – Our day of training began at 8:00 and the interesting variety of seminars made it difficult to choose only two. As always, the ADDC Certification Program was available; this year focusing on Marketing. An “Introduction to Petroleum Engineering” was offered, as well as “Excel Formulas and More” and Steptoe & Johnson, PLLC gave two presentations of “Appalachian Midstream and Regulatory Overview Marcellus & Utica issues in Appalachia”. “HOT Oil and Gas Plays in the Appalachian Basin” was also available and, the two that I chose “Leadership and Effective Communication” and “5 Traits of Professionalism”. All the speakers were entertaining, interesting and informative. Many members rounded out the day with a “Taste of Appalachia”, a buffet style presentation of samplings of Appalachian cuisine, along with a cooking demonstration by Chef Dale Hawkins preparing his “WV Gumbo”, (actually a Burgoo) which was FABULOUS!

Day 4 – Friday, the business session of the convention opened with a Call to Order by ADDC President Marilyn Carter, followed by the Invocation, Presentation of Colors, Pledge of Allegiance, singing of “O Canada” and “The Star Spangled Banner”. After President Carter made introductions, we received a warm welcome from Sean Hill, Governor Tomblin’s Regional Representative, from Mayor Danny Jones, from Region 1 Director, Charlene Tenney and from West Virginia Desk and Derrick Club President, Kathy Tawney. The Keynote Speaker, Jerry Grantham, Vice President of Range Resources Southern Appalachia Division, then gave a presentation about “The Lower Huron – Not Your Typical Shale Play.”



We received reports from various committees and it was reported that **321** members representing **54** clubs (out of 59) registered for Convention and **84** First Timers were recognized (including our President, Val Bode). There was an Open Forum where any member was able to approach and offer to the Board, delegates and members any topic of concern or questions. Proposed amendments to ADDC Bylaws and Standing Rules were addressed and the Business Session was recessed for the day.

We were asked to proceed to the Salute to Industry Luncheon where our Keynote Speaker Russ Schetroma with Steptoe & Johnson, PLLC presented an energetic, amusing and very informative talk on “The Appalachian Basin: An Overview of Industry Trends and Issue”.

Friday night was game night! There was a tailgate dinner with burgers and dogs, nachos and wings, dips and chips and more. Most everyone came wearing their team colors. The evening’s entertainment was a Game Show Mania and that doesn’t even begin to describe this show. Sandy Sowell, with her “Name That Tune” type game, had everyone laughing from the first question until the final bell.



Gathering participants from the audience, four sets of two person teams tried to “buzz in” before the other teams and answer the question Sandy asked about the song. With strict instructions for NO HELP FROM THE AUDIENCE, I found myself having to cover my mouth, so as not to yell out the answer when my team didn’t know it. I would venture to guess there were many like myself that had sore stomach muscles from the uncontrollable belly laughs, blurred vision from the tears in my eyes, and a sore throat from all the cheering on of our team.
