



Takeaway Capacity of Crude Oil and Natural Gas in the Permian Basin

Takeaway infrastructure

A producer may invest in infrastructure to transport their commodity to marketers with the goal to bring tangible benefits back to the well. An example of this is Laredo Petroleum's investment in multiple production corridors which can each support takeaway for up to 600-800 wells in a



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condensed area. This infrastructure includes crude, natural gas and water gathering, water distribution and recycling, and centralized gas lift compression. Natural gas coming off the lines can be used as rig fuel as opposed to buying diesel. The benefits include capital savings, lease operating expense savings and price uplift as well as decreased dependence on third party providers and buyers.

Permian Basin

The Permian Basin is known for its over 4,500 feet of stacked shale pay zones and producers drilling horizontal laterals up to and greater than 10,000 feet. While the United States rig count from October 2014 to May 2016 has decreased 80%, the Permian Basin rig count, as a proportion of the total rig

count, has increased 12% to 54%. The Permian Basin production rate is approximately two million barrels of oil a day.

Oil takeaway

An oil pipeline's LACT (lease automatic custody transfer) provides for automatic measurement and transfer of oil from the lease location into a pipeline. An oil pipeline, versus a 180 barrels of oil capacity semi-truck, is cheaper, safer and even works on holidays!



The Midland to WTI Cushing differential reached almost \$14 per barrel around October 2014 because of the supply glut to get oil out of the Permian Basin with limited takeaway options to Cushing, Oklahoma or capacity-restrained Permian Basin refineries. Soon oil pipelines were brought online with optionality to the Houston Gulf Coast Market substantially diminishing this differential.


Natural gas takeaway

A natural gas meter is used for measurement and the natural gas is

compressed, transported via pipeline and processed separating residue natural gas and natural gas liquids, which are further refined through fractionation. Alternatively, natural gas may be flared at the wellhead if the cost outweighs the benefit. The Permian Basin production rate is approximately 7,000 million cubic feet per day with only approximately 6,800 million cubic feet per day processing capacity.

Marketing considerations

Producers must weigh the costs vs benefits of their marketing options while considering benchmark pricing, gathering, handling and processing, commodity quality, contract terms and commitment.















I had the privilege to join a few Tulsa members in attending the 2016 Annual ADDC Convention in Denver as an alternate delegate. As a first-timer, many people brought their club pins to trade with me and we formed new friendships. There I met many friendly faces who shared their passion for the club's mission. This is vital as we retain and recruit members to join us in learning about energy.

I took a field trip on a bus driving around Duke Conoco Phillips' cryogenic natural gas processing plant and found it to be quite complex and interesting. DCP staff explained how vapors are chilled, recovered and stabilized, and how natural gas liquids are stored. I learned that a 5-stage compressor strips out harmful hydrogen sulfide (H2S) gas. Attendees also observed the reflux condenser which takes CO2 and H2S to drums nearby for pickup. A demethanizer is a large tower than separates the methane rising to the top from the cold NGLs falling out the bottom to go to be piped or trucked to a rail yard. I am more thankful than ever for the engineers at plants like DCP who help bring natural gas to my stovetop every day and to my home to provide heat during cold months.

ADDC's lease certification course challenged attendees to learn about how to read a land lease and understand the components and history of leasing. I enjoyed focusing on education with other attendees from all over the country and Canada.

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
