

1<sup>st</sup> Annual ADDC Central Region Meeting - A Seasoned Member's Perspective By Gay Wheeler

As a "seasoned" D&D member who has attended over 30 Region VI meetings, it seems odd to be attending the **1st Annual** Central Region Meeting. Due to region realignment in the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs last year, Region VI was combined with 5 Texas Clubs – Dallas, Fort Worth, Graham, Lone Star and Wichita Falls. The meeting was hosted by the Oklahoma City Club, April 11-14, 2019, at the ALOFT Hotel in Oklahoma City. I was looking forward to seeing my D&D friends from the former Region VI clubs, as well as meeting new friends in our new Central Region. I was so happy to see that I already knew many of the attendees from the Texas clubs, as I have met them at past ADDC Conventions.

My Friday morning started early with a field trip to the Oklahoma Geological Survey (OGS), in Norman, Oklahoma. Richard Tarver, Data and Collections Manager, began our tour in the Well Data Library. The library stores paper logs for more than 367,000 wells, some of which are even available on microfiche (an antiquated form of viewing documents). The collection also includes strip logs dating back to the 1890s, completion reports back to the early 1900's, and copies of aerial photos dated from 1940 to 1960 which are organized by county. In 2002, British Petroleum donated a large collection of core samples to the University of Oklahoma. This valuable collection plus a \$3 million grant helped establish the Oklahoma Petroleum Information Center (OPIC). The OGS and OPIC facility covers approximately 193,000 square feet, about the size of 4 football fields.

Next, we explored the rock and mineral storage room where various types of rocks were on display. One particular rock of interest was the barite rose rock, unique to Oklahoma and our state rock. Rose rocks formed within the Garber Sandstone formation where barite crystals precipitate from groundwater in the pore spaces between quartz sand grains. I am a rock hound and was thrilled when were allowed to select a rose rock for a souvenir.

We continued on to a warehouse containing hundreds of file cabinets full of well logs and production reports. The OGS is in the process of scanning these documents and will eventually make the digital copies available on their website. Adjacent to this room is the beginning of the vast core and sample library. The cores are a source of information to aid in oil and gas exploration, as well as for groundwater and environmental studies. Several core samples were set out in the display room for us to view. It was interesting to see the different colors and layers as the core samples increased in depth.

Our last stop was the OGS Publication Sales Office. Various maps and publications are available for purchase there. Several members of our group were interested in the USGS 7.5 minute quadrangle maps of the state. This is a topographic map covering 7.5 minutes of longitude by 7.5 minutes of latitude. These maps are commonly used by hikers, campers, hunters, and those who enjoy outdoor activities. The sales office made a few dollars off our group that day. This was a very informative tour and enjoyed by all.

Our host club also offered other educational opportunities: a field trip to the Oklahoma History Center at the State Capitol, a certification program on accounting, and a seminar "Violations of 1<sup>st</sup> Annual ADDC Central Region Meeting - A Seasoned Member's Perspective (cont)

the Social Contract". I did not attend these, but I'm sure they were very rewarding and educational to those who did.

Our Friday night social found us at the Dust Bowl in downtown OKC. What better way to get to know our fellow Central Region members than a night of bowling. I dusted off my old bowling ball and hit the lanes with a few friends from Tulsa, Enid, Butler County and Great Bend. We didn't break any scoring records but we had a great time anyway.

We were up and at 'em early Saturday morning for the "Business Session". Connie Bass, 2019 Central Region Director gave a warm welcome and opened the meeting with the Presentation of Colors and Pledge of Allegiance by Girl Scout Troop #3469. Oklahoma City Mayor David Holt welcomed us to the city and spoke about all the exciting changes that are taking place.

Three ADDC officers attended the meeting: Terry Ligon, President; Keith Atkins, President Elect; and Wendy Sparks, Secretary. The Central Region has 13 clubs and 306 members total. Fifty-seven members were registered for the meeting. The Enid Club nominated Shelly McCool from the floor for 2020 Central Region Director, and the delegates approved by acclamation. Congrats to Shelly! The Dallas Club will host the 2020 Central Region Meeting in Allen, Texas, April 23-26, 2020. Tammy Watkins, Co-General Arrangements Chair 2019 Convention, reported on plans for the Kansas City Convention, set for September 22-29, 2019. Director Connie Bass presided over the meeting in a very timely and professional manner.

Saturday's Industry Luncheon was kicked off with a toast by Pat Blanford of the Lone Star Club; honoring the industries in which we are employed. John Bargas, Senior Vice President of Government and Public Affairs for OIPA/OKOGA, presented the keynote address at the luncheon. The program was "Unapologetically Fueling a Stronger Oklahoma". He was a very dynamic and interesting speaker. He talked about what OIPA/OKOGA is doing to educate the public about the positive impact the oil and gas industry has on Oklahoma and its future. Here are some interesting tidbits from his presentation:

- 1 in 6 jobs in Oklahoma are tied to energy
- 25% of all taxes paid in Oklahoma come from the oil and gas industry
- In 2018, Oklahoma earthquakes declined by 76% despite production and drilling increases.
- 2018 oil and gas industry contributions to education were over \$693 million

Mr. Bargas closed his presentation with a preliminary version of the "Unapologetic" campaign video produced by OIPA/OKOPA. He was very knowledgeable about the political and industry issues in Oklahoma and answered a barrage of questions at the end of his program. I think he might be a possible speaker for Tulsa in the future.

Saturday evening was the "Grand Finale" of Region Meeting, the Awards Banquet. We were a very fine looking crowd in our fancy clothes and were ready to celebrate the success of our 1st Annual Central Region Meeting. Terry Ligon, 2019 ADDC President presented the keynote address. She did an excellent job on her speech, considering she didn't even know she was speaking until she arrived at the meeting Thursday. Her speech, titled "Follow Your Arrow Wherever It Points", highlighted the qualities that every good leader should possess. Terry is one of many examples of the success you can gain by "Following Your Arrow".



1<sup>st</sup> Annual ADDC Central Region Meeting - A First Timer's Perspective By Alesia Bailey

I am very appreciative to the Tulsa Club for sending me as an Alternate to the Delegate, Dorothy Lenhart. As a "newbie" first time attendant to a Desk and Derrick Regional Meeting, I did not have any expectations of how the Association realignment would affect the event. The Oklahoma City Club hosted the First Annual ADDC Central Region Meeting at a great venue and I was very impressed with the speakers, planned activities and educational component of the weekend.



I attended the Friday morning field trip to the Oklahoma Petroleum Information Center at the Oklahoma Geological Survey of the University of Oklahoma. The Data and Collections Manager, Richard Tarver called the OPIC's public repository the "coral reef of donated collections" with over 500,000 boxes of core and cuttings from over 25,000 wells. For nominal fees, the OGS offers short-term core storage, core slabbing and plug extraction of core samples. Mr. Tarver shared, "the cores are priceless as we will never have these exact representations again. An extensive cuttings library of drilling fragments is used by geologists who may even bring their own microscopes to study the different formations on large core tables under florescent lights and OPIC offers gamma ray scans and x-ray imaging. Hundreds of file cabinets house mud and electric data logs, and as the official repository for Oklahoma's paper logs, OGS has an extensive publications inventory with topographic maps dating back to circa 1908. Mr. Tarver shared about two newer projects underway at the OGS – integrating all their inhouse data with 100's of years of geologic scholarship into a web-based repository with well viewer that is about to be beta tested.

Users will be able to pull up well information, logs, groundwater, hazards, etc., and workshops will soon be held to review the capabilities. Secondly, the cartography department at OGS has started a partnership with a drone consulting company across the street to begin mapping.

Friday evening we attended the bowling event at the Dust Bowl, a small retro bowling alley with a vintage 1970's flair. My daughter joined us for the evening, and we met several ladies from other clubs and got to visit with Tulsa Club members while enjoying a little healthy competition!

Saturday morning the business meeting started at 8 a.m. led by Connie Bass the Central Region Director. Connie kept the sessions moving timely and noted that she interspersed the order of individual Club reports with other Association level business and reporting. I found this to be very engaging and a great way to recap the past year's activities and see first-hand the Parliamentary procedures used in the formal meeting. Our Immediate Past President and Delegate, Dorothy Lenhart, gave the Tulsa Club report for Jill Klein and I was surprised to learn that Tulsa is the largest club in our region at 39 current members. Dorothy added that 12 new members joined in the first quarter of 2019 alone and challenged that we would have 40 members by May! This is directly attributable to the fearless work of our new President, Jill Klein and all the other volunteers who refused to let our club disband. It was sobering to hear of many of the smaller clubs struggling to maintain interest and membership and made me more appreciative of what Tulsa has recently experienced. With so many demands on peoples' time, it is very important to keep our club relevant, seek new members and stay focused on our educational mission – and as a member who drives across town to attend, I echo the positive feedback I've personally heard about the streamlined structure and educational focus of our luncheon meetings.

Tammy Watkins gave the 2019 Convention Report to be held in Kansas City, Missouri September 22-29, 2019. The Convention Committee has worked extremely hard to put together a top-notch program with many fun social and educational activities. The 2020 Region Meeting plans are underway as well, so save the date for April 23-26 in Allen, Texas. Be sure to check into both opportunities! The afternoon Open Forum was a lively exchange of information and questions from the floor. Connie shared a gold key with attendees and spoke on three keys for success: 1) key to the past – what would the founders of Desk & Derrick think of how far the organization has come?; 2) key to the present – how do we retain our membership?; 3) key to the future – how do we revitalize and recruit?



Saturday evening's Awards Banquet had a red-carpet theme complete with Oscar statuettes given to award recipients. Terry Ligon, 2019 ADDC President, gave a heartfelt speech on leadership based on a song entitled, "Follow Your Arrow Wherever It Points." In keeping with the "key" topic started earlier in the day by Connie, Terry shared her key qualities of leadership and learning in following your own arrow. She quoted one of my favorite leadership authors, John C. Maxwell, "A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way and shows the way." Terry challenged us to all cultivate honesty, confidence, empathy, positivity and enthusiasm as we practice delegating, trusting and inspiring others to bring their unique gifts and strengths to grow our organization.

### Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge Field Trip By Gay Wheeler

This is the fourth time I've gone to the Salt Plains to dig for selenite crystals, and also the wettest. The crystal digging area was partially flooded with water and it didn't take long for our newly dug holes to fill with water. Then we were pretty much "fishing" for crystals. It was fun to watch our members develop their own unique style of crystal excavation.



#### **Unique Hourglass**

Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge is the only known site in the world where unique selenite crystals with hourglass inclusions are found. Because these crystals form in wet soil, sand and clay, particles are included within the crystal giving them their unique "hourglass" shape inside.



### Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge Field Trip to dig Selenite Crystals May 4, 2019 By Jill Klein

A group of members and relatives drove about 2.5 hours over to Jet, Oklahoma to the Salt Plains. It was a cool, cloudy morning but we were in-between rain storm days and as the clouds burned off the cool weather was welcomed. When we arrived at the salt plains it looked like a lake, the rain in recent days had added water to the plains. However, we used this to our digging advantage, using the water to wash the sand and clay from around the crystals. The surface was still firm to walk on, you didn't sink in the mud. It took a couple of tries to get going. Gay was experienced and gave us pointers to start. After digging a couple of holes we discovered an area where the crystals were only about 2 inches under the surface. We started pulling the fragile crystals out and washing off the clay. We got all types and sizes, flat ones with the classic hour-glass coloring up to 3 inches long, small pieces and a few attached together; but we didn't find a large cluster that was intact. It was a dirty job but lots of fun, children with other groups were laughing and excited about digging in the sand. Adults like our group were digging seriously, going for that next big prize crystal!

The refuge of salt plains attracts many birds during migration. We happened to be on the hunt for a small bird called a Snowy Plover that nest there on the plains. Once we spotted the birds running around they were a joy to watch. I would love to spot a sandhill crane or whooping crane when they visit in the fall.

The digging made time fly by and before we knew the time, it was past lunchtime. Gay and her sister, Leah, set up a picnic buffet on the tailgate of the truck. Gay had thought of everything and good thing because digging works up an appetite. We decided after lunch we needed to head back home. A few of us took a quick tour of the State Park and then called it a day. The drive was really an easy one. Just the weekend before there had been a Crystal festival where they had prizes for crystals found, the local newspaper said they had people from all over travel to dig for the festival. Maybe we should go back next year for the festival.

Lurl and Ray Andrus married in 1956, then moved to Washington, D.C. They lived there 32 years. Lurl worked for American Petroleum Institute (API) as Legislative Assistant. She covered U.S. House and Senate legislation affecting the oil and gas industry and business community.

Lurl and Ray were active in political and social scenes for 32 years. Ray was attorney for the AFL-CIO. They were both involved in both political parties, including all the inaugural festivities.

While working for API, Lurl joined the Washington, D.C. Desk and Derrick Club, an affiliate of the Association of Desk and Derrick Clubs (ADDC), an international professional educational organization comprised of women and men in the energy industry. After joining the D.C. Club, she moved up to the office of President of the Washington, D.C. Club to be Regional I Director. She then rose up the ADDC Board to Secretary, Second Vice President, First Vice President, and President, then Board Advisor. As President, she became a skilled public speaker and leader; and played a major role in growing ADDC. She remained an active member of D&D until her death.

API rewarded Lurl's efforts by promoting her to Meeting Coordinator. She was responsible for planning, organizing and attending seven annual legislative meetings throughout the United States. She remained in that position until her retirement. Upon retirement, Lurl was honored for the many years of contributions to the industry and her dedication and hard work.

Lurl visited all 50 states and was also a world traveler. On her own she went by air, rail, water, bus and auto to Russia, Finland, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Netherlands, Greenland, Central America, Hong Kong, Bangkok, Singapore, Malaysia, China, Macao, Australia, New Zealand, Fiji Islands, Philippines, as well as many trips to the Caribbean, Canada and Mexico.

Lurl and Ray returned to the area in 1991 where they built a home in Nederland and with Jill, their Manx cat. Lurl cared for her mother, Lillie, until her death 1992. She became active in local civic groups and served in many capacities. The Department Club; 8th District of Federated Music Clubs; Concert Association of Southeast Texas (CAST); Knife and Fork Club; and TAMS. In 1999, she joined the Board of Trustees of the Community Retirement Home where she remained until her death. She was proud that during her term as President, rules were changed to allow residents to keep small pets on the premises.

Lurl was a member of the Methodist Temple; 70-year plus member of Eastern Star Chapter 953; Port Arthur Historical Society; Lamar College Alumni; Second Saturday Night Dinner Club; Third Friday night and biweekly bridge clubs; Commodores; Pompano Club; Golden Triangle Republican Women; and North Harris-Montgomery Counties Desk and Derrick Club. She attended Desk and Derrick Convention and Regional Meetings throughout her 50 year membership. Having missed only two since her first in 1968 she was honored for perfect attendance until 2007.


