

2022 CENTRAL REGION MEETING REPORT April 29 & 30, 2022 Hosted by: Desk & Derrick of Wichita Falls, TX

On Friday, we had a great complimentary breakfast at the hotel before boarding the bus for our Field Trip. We were entertained with some Tall Tales from the area. First there was the story of the World's Littlest Skyscraper in Wichita Falls, TX, built in 1919. Legend has it that some eager and naïve investors simply didn't read the fine print! (The scale on the blueprints was in inches, not feet!)

Then, in 1915, an Italian immigrant that "blew into" Wichita falls was not initially impressed by the city. By 1917 he had pulled up stakes and moved to Boston to work. Using the postal skills that he learned in Wichita Falls, as the foreign sales representative for the Wichita Motor Truck Company, in a small investment enterprise he developed a strategy that promised quick and large returns to investors. By 1920, he was raking in \$1 million a day from schemes based on paying earlier investors with money collected from later investors. That Italian immigrant's name? Carlo Pietro Giovanni Guglielmo Tebaldo Ponzi!

*The Felty Outdoor Museum was full of history and historical artifacts (early oil field equipment), from the Boom Town days of Burkburnett and the surrounding area. *Quasar Energy Services gave us a tour of their yard, explaining their services which include Frac'ing, Cementing, Acidizing & Nitrogen. *We were treated to a delectable lunch provided by Balon (valves) Corporation at the S&J Yard in Kamay, TX (there is also a story behind the name of that town!).

*We finished up by touring the Kimbell School of Geosciences at Midwestern State University, in Wichita Falls, led by Dr. Jonathan Price, PhD. and his students. It was fascinating!

We arrived back at the hotel in time for the Delegate/ Alternate meeting, followed by another bus ride to the Icebreaker at Horseshoe Bend Cellars Vineyard & Winery. We had a Texas barbecue dinner followed by a game of Jeopardy regarding movies and TV shows from the '50s through the '90's. A great time was had by all!

The Business Session began Saturday morning. Delegates/ Alternates checked in and the meeting began promptly at 8:00 am.

- Registrar's Report: Clubs eligible to vote: 10 Clubs represented at meeting: 9 (Wichita, KS was absent) Clubs needed for quorum: 6 Total members in Region: 177 Number registered for Meeting: 48
- The report was adopted by motion that was seconded and passed.
- Report of Official Program w/any changes was adopted by motion that was seconded and passed.
- Rules for Region Meeting were adopted by general consent.
- Report of Nominating Committee: There were no nominations for Region Director by the due date. Patsy Gomez, Lone Star Club of Dallas, nominated Val Williams from the floor and Val was voted 2023 Regional Director by the clubs in attendance.
- Val Williams, Lone Star Club of Dallas, led the Memorial/Celebration of Life, for all the members that the Club(s) have lost since the last in-person regional meeting that was held in 2019.
- 2022 Convention will be held Sept. 21st through Sept. 25th in the NE Region, Washington, PA. Packets will be coming out in May. 2023 Convention will be held in the West Region: Albuquerque, NM.
- 2023 Central Region Meeting will be held in El Dorado, KS, hosted by the Butler County Club.
- Jamie made introductions and Reports were read. Those reports can be found on the ADDC website, addc.org, by clicking on the dropdown for Region and then Region Meeting Reports, at the bottom.
- President's Reports/Letters were read, then it was time for lunch!

Kay McKinley, 2021 Central Region Director, was our speaker. She shared some experiences that she has had and was entertaining as well!

- AIMEE AWARDS (Achievement In Maintaining Energy Excellence) were awarded, 3 of which were to Tulsa!
- BEST LARGE BULLETIN: Jill Klein, Nov 2021, 1st Place.
- BEST INDUSTRY ARTICLE: Sarah Jones, Nov 2021, 2nd Place.
- BEST INDUSTRY PROGRAM: Title, Ownership and Property Rights in Indian Country, Nov 2021, Conor Cleary; Coordinator/Author; Lisa Parsons/Jake Sherman, 1st Place.
- MEMBERSHIP RECOGNITION (service awards) were presented, two of which of those were to Tulsans: Vicki Barnes with 10 years and Beth Hesling with 40 years!



A.I.M.E.E. Awards and Membership Recognition for Tulsa

After Lunch the discussion was pretty open:

- 2024 Central Region Meeting and Convention will be in TX.
 The Ft Worth club will host one and Lonestar/Dallas will
 host the other... All 10 of the Central Region Clubs are
 asked to help with hosting the Convention.
- Are we good with the Proposed Amendments to the Region Bylaws? Presidents need to check with the membership and be ready to vote via email in 30 days.
- Everybody was in agreement that WE NEED TO GET THE WORD OUT! We can recruit at O&G company lunches, Schools (besides Magic Suitcase, like colleges) and Events (such as the AAPG convention we did in Oct and the EnviroWorkshop we did in Mar)
- All the clubs need to focus on marketing:
- Social Media (Sarah mentioned an app called Buffer (www.buffer.com) that we could use to link sites together. It used to be free when only posting to 3 social sites. We need more research to see what is available today. We can also use hashtags for searches, etc...),
- Ads in publications and Attendance at Trade Shows, etc.

A lot of times we have to "Spend Money, to Make Money".

One of the ladies was at the NAPE convention in Feb and said people she spoke to didn't know that Desk & Derrick was still around! This week in Petroleum History, May 9th to May 15th

Date	Event
May 9, 1863	Confederate Cavalry raids Oilfield -A brigade of Confederate cavalry attacked a thriving oil town near the Ohio River in what would soon become West Virginia. Confederate Gen. William "Grumble" Jones led the cavalry attack on Burning Springs oilfield storage facilities containing thousands of barrels of oil. The Confederate raid's destruction and fire along the Kanawha River marked the first time an oilfield was targeted in war, according to one West Virginia historian. About 1,300 Confederate troopers raided Burning Springs, destroying cable-tool drilling rigs and 150,000 barrels of oil.
May 11, 1888	S.R. Dresser patents Oil Well "Packer" Device-Solomon R. Dresser of Bradford, Pennsylvania, patented a rubber "packer" for sealing downhole pressure in wells. The technology behind the patent (no. 227419) helped confine gas, "which enters the well from the lower rocks and utilize its force or pressure to expel the oil from the well." After expanding into manufacturing oilfield pumps, engines and compressors, Dresser's company went public in 1928, moving its headquarters to Dallas in 1950. Dresser Industries merged with oilfield supply rival Halliburton for about \$7.7 billion in stock in 1998.
May 12, 2007	Oil and Gas Museums open in Oklahoma ConocoPhillips opened two petroleum museums on the same day in Ponca City and Bartlesville as part of the 2007 Oklahoma statehood centennial celebrations. Exhibits at the Conoco Museum In Ponca City educate visitors about the exploration, production and history of the company, which began in Utah as a small distributor of coal, grease, and kerosene. Conoco merged with Oklahoma's Marland Oil Company in 1929. Phillips Petroleum incorporated in 1917 and merged with Conoco in 2002. The Phillips Petroleum Company Museum includes exhibits describing the development of high-octane gasoline and revolutionary plastic products like Marlex. In addition to exhibiting oilfield technologies, the Bartlesville museum tells the story of Frank and L.E. Phillips.
May 14, 1953	Golden Driller Statue debuts at Petroleum Exposition-The "Golden Driller" first appeared at the International Petroleum Exposition in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Sponsored by the Mid-Continent Supply Company of Fort Worth, Texas, the giant oilfield work was temporarily erected again for the 1959 petroleum expo. The 76-foot-tall roughneck statue attracted so much attention the company refurbished and donated it to the Tulsa County Fairgrounds. Completely rebuilt in 1966, the statue was refurbished several times since the late 1970s.
May 15,1911	Supreme Court orders Standard Oil Breakup-After reviewing 12,000 pages of court documents, Chief Justice Edward White issued the U.S. Supreme Court's majority opinion that mandated dissolution of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. The ruling, which broke Standard Oil into 34 separate companies, upheld an earlier Circuit Court decision that the John D. Rockefeller company's practices violated the Sherman Antitrust Act. Five years earlier, President Theodore Roosevelt's Justice Department had launched 44 anti-trust suits against railroad, beef, tobacco, and other trusts.


