

#### The History of Oil Well Firefighting and Blowout Control "A Tribute To Brave Men" Presented by Mike Shellman

On November 9, 2011, The Desk and Derrick Club of Tulsa hosted their Industry Awareness Luncheon at the Tulsa Country Club with historian Mike Shellman of San Marcos, Texas. Mr. Shellman had previously presented his program to the Desk and Derrick Club of Tulsa in 2006. It was such a success that we decided to ask him to come back!! It was a pleasure that he did agree to come back and do his presentation for us again.

With the passing away of "Coots" Mathews in 2010, Mike went back on the road sharing with the industry his experiences and respect and admiration for these special people: "Red" Adair, "Boots" Hansen, and "Coots" Mathews. Mike worked for Boots and Coots from 1993 to 1997 and became friends with all of them, and now he wants to share the stories and heroics of these famous Oil Well Fire Fighters.

Mike's presentation had many videos and slides showing blowouts with audio so that the audience could have some idea of how loud the blowouts were. On some of the videos, music was added to heighten the experience of what it was like when a fire was in progress and the role the fire fighters played in putting the well fires out after a blowout. A blowout is the uncontrolled release of crude oil and/or natural gas from an oil well or gas well after pressure control systems have failed. Causes of blowouts are reservoir pressure, formation kick and well control; types of blowouts are surface blowouts, subsea blowouts, and underground blowouts. Prior to the invention of pressure control equipment in 1920, the uncontrolled release of oil and gas from a well while drilling was common and was known as an oil gusher, gusher, or wild well.

Myron M. Kinley was the first pioneer in fighting oil well fires. Myron was born in Santa Barbara, California, in 1898. He passed away May 12, 1978, at his home in Chickasha, Oklahoma. He became familiar with the oilfield since his father Karl T. Kinley was an oil well shooter in California. His father dynamited wells to fracture the rock and to increase flow on a well in 1913. The high risk of danger on the blowouts proved deadly for Myron's brother Lloyd in 1938. Myron had permanent damage to his right leg in 1936. Paul Neal "Red" Adair came into the oil well fighter's picture after serving in WWII in the bomb disposal unit with Myron Kinley. "Red" was born in 1915 and passed away in 2004. He started the famous Red Adair Co., Inc., in 1959. He battled more than 2000 land and offshore oil well fires during his career. Lieutenants, Asger "Boots" Hansen and Ed "Coots" Mathews worked for "Red" until they started their own well fire control company called Boots and Coots. The 1968 John Wayne movie "*Hellfighters*" was based upon the experiences of Adair during the 1962 Sahara Desert Fire. The movie and Mike's presentation will definitely give you a better understanding of how dangerous it is to fight oil fires. "Red", "Boots" and "Coots" were on location for the filming of *"Hellfighters"* as technical advisors.

The time Mr. Shellman spent and stories he heard, especially from Coots, is a bond he will always have. Mike continues to present his program so that the history and the risks taken by the brave men of oil well fire fighting are not forgotten. Of the four (4) men who started this business, only "Boots" Hansen survives to this day.
